The Public Information Act

Most of you have probably heard of the Freedom of Information Act commonly referred to as the public information act. Some of you may even have filed with a governmental agency, such as a school, for information under this Act.

Several times a year my office receives public information requests from marketing firms. Most often the request is for the names, addresses and telephone numbers of students and/or employees. Because this is considered public "directory" information, the district is required to comply with the request. The only names we can omit are those who have requested, in writing, that their information be kept confidential. Parents may make this request for minor children. If you allow your child's name and information to appear in any type of published directory, such as a student directory, then the district must give this same information to any entity requesting it under this Act.

If you receive any kind of promotional material in the mail or receive a sales call that implies that Argyle ISD has submitted your name or your student's name to their company, I would advise you to exercise caution. The district does not sell mailing lists nor provide student lists to organizations unless it is compelled to do so. If you are ever in doubt about the legitimacy of a contact made to you ostensibly with the approval of the district, please contact my office and we will be happy to assist you. In addition, if you would like to have your students name kept confidential please contact your campus administrator regarding the process.



Recycling For Profit

Sometime in the next thirty days two large paper recycling bins will be placed on the south side of the middle school/high school parking lots. These bins will be for the collection of paper only. Twice a month these bins will be emptied and the district will be compensated for the paper goods collected.

The money will be split between the middle school and high school activity funds. You can help our students by collecting your paper goods and dropping them off at one of our bins. It is not too early to start saving paper now. If this effort proves to be successful, then the district may add a bin at Hilltop Elementary as well. There are two important rules that we ask everyone to follow: (1) Please make sure that all paper goods are placed inside the bins. Items left outside will litter the campus and create a nesting place for rodents and harmful insects. (2) Please do not place anything except paper goods in the bins and make sure that all paper goods are free of food, drink or other items that might attract vermin. This is an exciting project. It gives our citizens and students an opportunity to protect the environment and generate needed money at the same time. I hope you will consider assisting with this effort.

Paper Goods In The Cafeteria

Recently I was asked why paper goods such as paper plates were used in our cafeterias instead of reusable trays. As someone who has been interested in making responsible use of our

earth's resources for many years, I thought this was a very good question. The answer may surprise you. The energy and water consumption necessary to wash large numbers of plates consumes more resources than using disposable paper goods. In addition, the use of paper trays provides considerable savings to the district.

According to Debra Lawson, our cafeteria consultant, the paper trays and plastic forks cost a campus of 650-675 students about \$108.00 per week. The cost to hire an additional employee for one hour a day to wash dishes plus the chemicals would run \$290.00 per week. When costs for electricity and water usage are added to this amount one can easily say that reusable trays would cost 3 ½ to 4 times more than using paper. Therefore, it is both – more ecologically sound and cost efficient to use disposable items in our cafeterias.

RED RIBBON WEEK---How did it start?

What is it?

Red Ribbon Week, October 22-30, 2005, offers a reminder of how one life can have a positive impact on the lives of millions. Red Ribbon Week is the most

far-reaching and well-known drug prevention event in America. The National Family Partnership, which coordinates Red Ribbon activities nationally, estimates that over 80 million Americans participate in Red Ribbon events.

National Red Ribbon week serves as a tribute to Special Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena who was brutally tortured and murdered by drug traffickers in Mexico. Enrique "Kiki" Camarena grew up in a dirt-floored house with hopes and dreams of making a difference. Camarena worked his way through college, served in the Marines and became a police officer. When he decided to join the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, his mother tried to talk him out of it. "I can't not do this," he told her. "I'm only one person, but I want to make a difference."

The DEA sent Camarena to work undercover in Mexico investigating a major drug cartel believed to include officers in the Mexican army, police and government. On Feb. 7, 1985, the 37-year-old Camarena left his office to meet his wife for lunch. Five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him in a car. One month later, Camarena's body was found in a shallow grave. He had been tortured to death.

In honor of Camarena's memory and his battle against illegal drugs, friends and neighbors began to wear red badges of satin. Parents, sick of the destruction of alcohol and other

drugs, had begun forming coalitions. Some of these new coalitions took Camarena as their model and embraced his belief that one person can make a difference. These coalitions also adopted the symbol of Camarena's memory, the red ribbon.

The National Family Partnership organized the first Nationwide Red Ribbon Campaign in 1988. In 1988 Congress proclaimed the last full week in October to be Red Ribbon Week. This campaign reaches millions of children every year, urging them to live safe and drug-free lives.

Red Ribbon Week is a time for gratitude for all the lives that remain drug free, a time to pledge to live a safe and drug-free life and a time to remember those lost in the fight against drugs. All three of the Argyle ISD campuses will be celebrating Red Ribbon Week this year. At Hilltop this year the school's theme is "Growing Drug-Free Kids." Each student will have the opportunity to plant a red bulb that will bloom in spring around the building. Students will also be planting a red oak tree in honor of Red Ribbon Week. Other activities include slipping into a drug-free life on Monday (wearing slippers), socking it to drugs on Tuesday (wearing crazy socks), teaming up against drugs on Wednesday (wearing a favorite team jersey), ensuring a bright future on Thursday (wearing sunglasses), and saluting drug-free kids on Friday (wearing fun hats).

At the middle school the student council sponsors Red Ribbon Week and will have a spirit/theme for each day of the week. Student council members will also pass out items such as bracelets, pencils, suckers, etc. and have the students sign a pledge to be drug free. High school student council also sponsors Red Ribbon Week and is planning a spirit/theme for each day of the week and the signing of a pledge to be drug free as well as a special speaker.

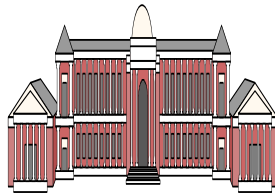

I have had the privilege to work as the middle school principal for the last three-and-a-half years of my educational career. I will say that I continue to enjoy working with middle school age children. As I contemplate what to write about this month, I am once again overwhelmed by the most pervasive problem that middle schools encounter. Bullying. We have had the problems surrounding bullying since I came to AMS and Mrs. Flanagan assures me that middle schools have always dealt with bullying. I believe her, because I remember with vividness my own middle

school days. I do not believe that because the problem has always been there, we should accept certain behaviors as “normal.” I believe that we must continue to address the problems of bullying and harassment among our children.

At Argyle Middle School the faculty and staff take bullying and teasing very seriously. As I have written before, I believe that one resource for us to help our children is the Love and Logic Institute, led by Jim and Charles Fay. I would encourage everyone to bookmark their website, www.loveandlogic.com, and reference the suggestions and wisdom found there frequently. I would draw your attention to an article “Teaseproof Your Kids,” by Jim Fay in which he gives parents particular strategies to help your child not be a victim of others who bully and tease. Empowering our children is the best way we can help them avoid the bully-victim cycle.

Safe School

Ambassadors (SSA) is a program I have been writing about consistently since last spring. SSA is a program that empowers children as well. We have trained thirty-six students and nine faculty and staff members to be the core group for SSA. During the training these students and adults learned about the cost of cruelty, how to identify bystanders, targets, and aggressors, and five different ways to intervene in the bully-victim cycle. I am excited about the possibilities to affect

our school climate as we launch SSA. I also understand that changing a climate takes time.

Once again, we are training PALS in the process of peer mediation. Mrs. Flanagan, in conjunction with Kathi Olson, are working with our eighth grade PALS students to help them become facilitators of conflict resolution with their peers. Creating a safe school environment for our children is paramount to our children’s success. Your help as parents is crucial to the process. I encourage you to read the article by Jim Fay noted earlier. Giving your children the tools to handle bullies is their best defense.

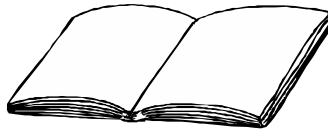
protect children from the dangers of alcohol and other drugs.

The Elementary Staff recently had a playground safety program. We would like to remind parents of a few things to help make our playgrounds safer.

1. Please be sure your student has correct foot wear for the playground. Shoes that do not provide good support can cause foot and ankle injuries. Shoes without adequate grip are often a cause for falls from equipment.

2. Children are beginning to wear jackets and hoods outside. While we make every effort to be sure equipment is safe, clothing can become entangled and cause choking and other falls and injury. Please be sure there are no pull strings or other loose parts of jackets that could become entangled in the equipment.

3. Teachers remind students of playground rules and courtesy, but it would be helpful if you would help re-emphasize these guidelines with your children.

For the newest addition to Rotary International, the beginning of this school year has caused reason to look ahead to a bright future for the Rotary Global Interact Club. This new

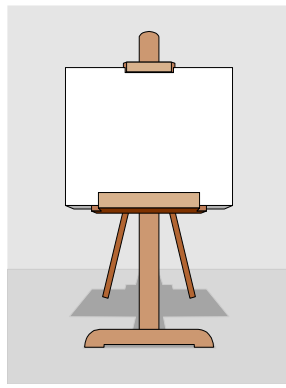

What is Artsonia?

We are excited to be part of Artsonia again this year. Artsonia is the world's largest student art museum. The students and I create classroom art projects, and I publish their

artwork in an online art gallery. Parents and extended family members come to Artsonia to see their children's art work and provide them encouragement and appreciation online.

Our school has their own site, Hilltop Elementary School, previously Argyle Elementary. Each student has his or her own gallery that includes all artwork by that student, since they became members.

In addition, Artsonia offers parents custom gift items such as coffee mugs and T-shirts with their own children's artwork. 15% of all the order revenue will be donated back to the school arts program, so this is also an art fundraiser.

Your student brought home information about Artsonia membership last month. Once you have signed and returned the form, your child's artwork will start appearing in the gallery. After you are registered with your email address, you will receive notification every time I add a new project.

On the Artsonia website, each student is identified only by a screenname which is usually the student's first name and number (e.g., Sarah22). There is no way for any website visitor to find out the identity of the student or to directly contact the student.

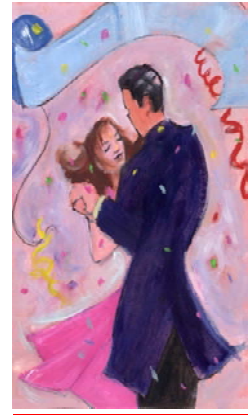
first organized in 1988. Since that time the campaign has touched the lives of millions of children in an effort to educate them on the dangers of drugs and alcohol.
